

Meet a couple of our 'in transit' students!

PIERRE, Davidson Grade 10



It was so much fun to interview Davidson. He had us laughing the whole time! His three favourite things are playing the trumpet, playing soccer, and eating goat stew... if he gets to do all these things in one day he sleeps smiling.

Davidson is the tallest boy in his school... so tall that he often gets questioned about being a student by new staff members. He fondly recalls a time when he "allowed" a new yard supervisor to accuse him of trespassing, and escort him from the school yard so that he could skip a test.

Davidson's sense of humour is unique in Haiti and it shines through everything he does. Sometimes it gets him into trouble, but we think it's a positive character trait that allows him to bring joy to difficult circumstances.

Davidson's parents live in the mountain community of Tetebef and most of his seven siblings still live in the small community with them. Davidson is very bright and was so set on going to school that his parents had him move down to the city of Grand Goave when he was young. He lives with his Aunt and she helps his parents by paying for his tuition. School tuition increases with each grade and the cost is now too much for them to afford. Helping Davidson finish school will provide him with increased opportunities.

Davidson's dream is to graduate High School, become a general mechanic, and have the ability to look after his parents as they age. It is our dream to come alongside him, and his family, to help that become a reality.

Occilene was born in Mount Blan, a small community in northern Haiti that is established on the side of a sand mine. Mount Blan means 'white mountain' and the dust of the fine white sand that is mined there covers everything! The community has no access to school and they need to walk hours to collect fresh drinking water.

Both of Occilene's parents passed away when she was young and she moved in with her adult cousin in Grand Goave. She got a late start at school but she had dreamed of going to school and she seized the opportunity. The hard work and determination that had been engrained in her so early in life helped immensely and Occilene gave school her full attention right up until she graduated.

Occilene's transition into her cousin's family was tough at first but their loving environment quickly drew her in and she found a place to flourish. She has dreamed of being a nurse for as long as she can remember and would like to return to her home community at some point to provide them with public health, and help them establish regular access to health care.

Occilene is perseverant and empathetic. She also has a solid work ethic and is compassionate and we believe she has the potential to become a great nurse one day. Will you help her get there?

It has been exciting this year to watch our SBL program unfold. Brigite Charles is a 58 year old mother of seven who is as hard working as they get. She was born and raised in Tetebef, and so were her children. She never attended school and has spent her entire life gardening and helping to raise animals.

For as long as she can remember Brigite has been selling fresh produce – either her own, or for her neighbours. She is a master at knowing how to price and how to barter. Her market day routine is to walk down the mountain before sunrise (which takes approximately 2 hours) and set up most of her produce by the side of the highway. She send her daughter to their regular market stall with the best of the produce & any non-perishable items they have to sell. She sells the majority of the produce (by the highway) in bulk very quickly, to regular clients or to other merchants who will resell in their own stalls. Brigite then joins her daughter to help sell the remaining produce at a higher price. They take turns touring the market to buy what they need for their family.

At the end of the day she packs up and spends the night at a family members house before returning to the mountains the next day. Brigite does this for two reasons - she's afraid of walking back up the mountain with an empty mule (on market day) as thieves will know she has sold her goods and has cash... and she's exhausted!

In addition to being hard working, she is also kind, friendly, honest and exceptionally wise. Her priority is always her family but she knows the importance of living in community and she looks out for her neighbours with a mothering touch.


Brigite applied for a business loan as she would like to expand her business to include more non perishable goods. Her eldest son now has a house close to the market so she'll be able to store her items there and just bring the produce down the mountain. She would also like to expand her business to enable her older daughters to be more involved.
